Hello and welcome to our latest Project Zion Podcast live event... Say What? I'm your host for tonight, Blake Smith, and I am really excited because this event is the kickoff for the newest Project Zion Podcast series, "Say What?" If you've been a PZP listener for very long, and for those of you who haven't, PZP is Project Zion Podcast, you know that we have a lot of different series. 21 to be exact. And the thing is, is that we don't have anything like this ... a series hosted by teenagers. So, I'm really pumped about this. I was down in Pensacola, Florida in June, and had a chance to see these young ladies in action with some older individuals in their multi-generation Sunday school class, and they were holding their own. So, I'm just really excited to see what they'll do with this podcast as we go forward. We've got lots to talk about, and we want to also be able to get your thoughts and questions and ideas. So let's get to it. The hosts of Say What? are two young women who, as I said, come from Pensacola, Florida. I've had the pleasure of knowing them for most of their lives. They attend the North Pensacola congregation of Community of Christ in Pensacola, Florida. And they are Mary Ann Bennett-Ripsam and Kassie Ripsam. Welcome Marianne and Cassie.

Now they tell me that they're nervous, but we know that our Project Zion Podcast listeners don't bite, so this is all going to be wonderful, and hopefully as we go along ... this is their first time, I think, on a podcast, right? Ladies,

Not to worry. Let's start by giving our listeners a chance. Well, I say our listeners, they're going to be your listeners to get to know you better. So how about telling us a little bit about yourselves? Either one of you, whoever wants to start.

So I'm Mary Ann. I'm 16 years old. I am really into engineering, like technical engineering, building, that kind of thing. And I'm also really into NASA and horses. Honestly, last year, actually, for my birthday, we went to the Space and Rocket Center over in Huntsville, and that was an amazing experience for me.

So how many, how many horses are there that have been in space with NASA?

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 03:07

I don't think there have been.

Oh, okay, ,just checking. I mean, you said you like NASA and horses. I thought maybe, maybe you'd seen them together.

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 03:19

I just got into horses. Um, I don't know how I got into horses. I just like, I just did.

Blake Smith 03:24

Horses are good. How about you, Kassie.

Kassie Ripsam 03:29

Hi, I'm Kassie. I am 15 years old. I absolutely love, well, any kind of art, really, as ... So, I like to draw. I like singing and acting, and so all of the different kinds of arts that I have gotten into are scattered all over my bedroom and the living room walls.

Excellent. Now, hearing you talk about yourselves and tell us about the things that you like, I couldn't help but notice when I got your BIOS to put on our team site that both of your BIOS say you love being homeschooled. So I'm wondering, did your mom help you write that part of your bio, or do you really like homeschooling?

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 04:18

We actually do. We travel often? So mommy loves to work in history or science lessons,

And she also loves things like grammar and English lessons as well, which she is very good at.

Kassie Ripsam 04:37

And we've been we've been homeschooled since preschool, and we have had, we were, of course, given a choice when, when we got, when we got older, to get into public school. But we have also, we've also been in a few we've been in choir. We've been in choir and co-ops and. Yes, we prefer our prefer our homeschooling environment and our and our different social opportunities.

Yeah, we like one of the things we went to when we were traveling. We went up in the St Louis Arch, and that was quite an experience. The ride up there, like you have this elevator thing that is meant to move so that it can go up the arch without tipping, but it rocks. It rocks, literally, that's

I've always wondered about that. You know, as many times as I've been through Saint Louis, I have never gone up in the arch, and I wondered how that elevator worked if you tipped over on your side on the way up. So ... Well, thanks for letting us know a little bit about yourself. How about the series, Say What?, I know that I have had an opportunity to talk with you guys and to brainstorm some things. But what are some of the things, some of the topics that our listeners might expect to hear on your new series, Say What?

Our hope is to ask whatever questions our peers, the other youth, might have about the church, the traditions and the, and you know, for example, World Conference and whatever traditions might be confusing to a youth, either on the inside or the outside. Frankly, we, we don't, we hear all of these things, but we don't exactly know what they might mean. So, what our hope is to ask those questions, and we're also wanting to empower youth voices in the church to see, to hear them, ask their questions and to and for them to maybe even teach adults.

And yeah, like even more, more than just youth need this info. Like, for example, some congregations cover their communion. They have no idea why. They've just been doing it their whole lives. So they do it because everybody else does it.

Kassie Ripsam 07:18

Our questions are What does this mean? Why do we do it like this?

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 07:23

We want to learn more?

Blake Smith 07:25

Yeah, well, there's nobody [better] than the younger folks to ask us. Why do we do that? As long as you're prepared to hear, like you just said, Marianne, that's because, because we've always done it that way, or because everybody does it that way, right? So that's awesome that you guys are going to have an opportunity to kind of push back a little bit and ask those tough questions of why we do things in particular ways. So, you talked a little bit about World Conference. What are some of the other topics

you think that the young people of the church, and also I would probably include the adults, might have questions about but maybe are afraid to ask.

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 08:03

Personally, I was thinking about, like, some of the verses in the Bible. We don't know why this means, why people say this means, what it means. Or like, for example, Daddy was talking about earlier, the armor, the armor of God, the Spirit, whatever. And like some people can misconstrue that to be offensive instead of defensive. So, like questions like that about the Bible, studying deeper about that kind of thing.

Kassie Ripsam 08:34

And in relation to World Conference for the youth, I want them to know what kinds of options they have, and if they want to be a delegate, what, what that would mean to be a delegate, and for that, for the for the adults as well, what exactly does that mean? And what, what am I expected to do as a delegate? Both youth and adults. And, how do I know to get up there, to get up there to the podium and speak? I don't know how. I don't know how to do that if I were to be a delegate, and if I don't, if I don't get up there and speak, because maybe I'm scared to get up there and speak. How do I, how do I get my ideas up there? How does this all work?

Okay, so like how the resolutions are submitted, and what happens when they come to the floor, and how do you speak to them, and all of those kinds of things? [mmm hmm] Great. And I think we've also talked about you, you mentioned being a delegate, but also Youth Service Corp. What does it mean? How do you be a part of that? What are the kinds of options of things that you might do? And we've also talked about, I think you guys are interested in also hosting some of the authors of the resolutions, people who submitted resolutions, and hearing their perspective outside of conference to hear why those matters are important to them. What is some of the background and that kind of thing, right? [Right] That's great, and I think it is, we talk about that being important for our youth to hear because we know that there are questions, and a lot of times really, not only our youth, but again, our adults are afraid to ask those questions, because they might think, "oh, somebody thinks I should know that answer already, so I don't want to ask the question." So, I have a feeling you're gonna have a lot of adult listeners who are going, "Oh, I've been wanting to ask that question since I was a kid, and I just didn't have a chance to ask." Well, how about guests? Who are some of the guests that you really like to have on your podcast?

Other youth workers like maybe people who work with youth or people who you know, are you?

Kassie Ripsam 10:46

I was thinking it would be great to have someone who was in Youth Service Corps, or a and or a youth delegate. And I was also thinking Molly Wilkins would be a great idea for youth area.

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 11:02

She's also one of the harmony leaders.

Blake Smith 11:06

She's president of harmony now, yeah.

Kassie Ripsam 11:09

And so, we could get someone like Larry who to answer questions about the church, and someone like Dave Nii or Moana Faana to answer questions about conference.

Blake Smith 11:22

How about the President/Prophet Designate of the church, Stassi Cramm?

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 11:27

yes.

Kassie Ripsam 11:28

That'd be pretty, pretty interesting. That would be great. Like

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 11:34

Bernard. Bunda Chippewa, I can't pronounce it, sorry. I'm sorry.

Blake Smith 11:38

Bundha Chibwe, yeah. Bundha, who's going to, who has been called to join the First Presidency. Yes, lots of interesting folks in the World Church Leadership Council that you might have a real good time interviewing and asking them questions from your perspective, rather than just all the questions that adults might want to ask. So what excites you most about hosting this new series? I know, when I first asked you guys if you would be interested in considering hosting a podcast, you both seem pretty excited. What is, what's the most exciting thing for you as you think about this?

Kassie Ripsam 12:16

I honestly it just feels to me, it feels to me like another, another chance to ask more of our questions. And it that is exciting to me. You know, I I have a lot of questions.

Blake Smith 12:34

We all do Kassie, we all do,

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 12:37

Like for me, it's also some of the opportunity that it has, ministry wise, would be amazing, and also kind of sounds like a lot of fun.

Blake Smith 12:48

It can be, absolutely can be. What do you think is most important for young people to have a voice in the church today? Or why do you think it is important for that? You

know, by giving a youth a voice, you are giving them more chances to both learn and to teach. And that I feel is extremely important in a church setting, it's really important in any setting, but especially in a church setting, because they're going to have those questions that not only give them the opportunity to learn, but also make adults stop and think, "Huh, I never thought about that. Or maybe I did think about that, but I never asked that question."

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 13:33

And then personally, the fact that, yeah, if they give fresh ideas, you see these memes about the weird questions kids ask, but like they honestly are thinking deeply about this question, and it means a lot to them. It may seem silly to you, but it means a lot to them. It just to brush them off, it hurts them.

Blake Smith 13:58

So, what do you hope to accomplish through this podcast. You've talked a little bit when you were talking about guests, you mentioned adults earlier. You were talking about having some youth on to have their say. What is it that you hope you can accomplish? I mean, teaching is one of those, and good luck to that. I've been trying to teach adults for years, so maybe you will have better luck than I have. I'm just kidding, but that is, that's a great goal. What else you hope to accomplish?

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 14:28

Just like knowing that youth are doing a lot in their area, I have a couple friends, Tucker and Soleil, and they did a lot in their congregation. They organized events that they had originally they had really small numbers, and then they started organizing youth events, and their numbers just grew until they were a pretty sizable church. So just getting that out there that youth and other people are doing. Something about this that it's not all just, oh, my congregation is so small, and I don't know what what in the world to do about it and stuff like that.

Kassie Ripsam 15:09

I'm hoping to expand not only the horizons of the people who are guests, but also mine as well as I ask the questions and hear the answers, because I might be asking a question that not only my friends want to hear the answer to, but I honestly do not know the answers to my questions. I am hoping to learn as well.

Blake Smith 15:31

Great. I started in ministry 30 years ago as a youth minister, and one of the things that drove me crazy was when people said to me, "Well, we're just so excited that you're working with the youth, because they're the future of the church." That drives me crazy, because I believe that the youth are part of the present of the church and have so much to offer us. And I think that we think, well, because they're not adults, they don't know what the challenges are. I'm wondering, what do you guys think are some of the biggest challenges facing the church as we look to reach and engage younger generations? There's no doubt that a lot of our churches are older folks.

Kassie Ripsam 16:16

That's true, and it's a hard question. It might be a question of a comfort zone, what a person is used to, and they're they might, might just be afraid of what, what youth might try and intrude onto that comfort zone, like, for example, my usual example is music. People are used to hearing the same hymns. They're used to hearing the organ play instead of something different, and they're afraid of not just that, but other things that might come with that.

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 16:57

It'll be like a really big learning curve, and habits die hard.

Blake Smith 17:02

So, do you think the church needs to communicate in different ways? Like, for instance, tonight, we were talking about, before we began, talking about the fact that we were going to try to take questions from Instagram. Where is it that that youth make their biggest connections that the church ought to be present in?

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 17:25

Snapchat, YouTube, places like that.

Blake Smith 17:29

Do you think, with your peers that there's a lot of social media engagement?

Kassie Ripsam 17:33

Yes, mostly Yes.

Blake Smith 17:36

And, what about, what about worship? Now, you guys are not only part of a traditional congregation, but you also are engaged with the CCM ministry, correct?

Kassie Ripsam 17:46

Right. Yes.

Blake Smith 17:48

So what are some of the experiences that you've, you know, you've experienced between those two that think, Oh, this is a way that I really connect?

Kassie Ripsam 17:56

You see, those two are very different. [They are] um, it's not only the different music, but the different methods of preaching that are extremely different.

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 18:12

some of the songs and stuff like that that aren't CCM, you can often find on the radio, like places like K love or on our heart radio. But I think the biggest thing that is different are the relationships, because looking forward to new people, you don't often find that you expect new people at your congregation,

but when you go to things like CCM and camps like reunion or youth camp that you look forward to meeting new people, depending on who you are, of course, you look forward to meeting new people. And so you're in that zone of making new friends.

Kassie Ripsam 18:57

And when I mentioned the preaching, the people that CCM has preached, or I used the right word earlier, is radical, radical creatures, and they intrude on the comfort zone so easily. So it's very inspiring. And the comfort zone that I'm finding, even in CCM and in our congregation, is how hard it is to really define "contemporary," because it usually within a 10 year span of when something was made.

Blake Smith 19:41

Correct. Contemporary can just mean new current.

Kassie Ripsam 19:44

That's what we're trying to get people to understand. Is this song you're saying is contemporary is over 30 years old.

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 19:53

Some of that is probably the music that somebody is requesting you. But sometimes, yeah, it's, it's very difficult.

Kassie Ripsam 20:05

It's alright to play a few older songs, but that's not all I want to hear.

Blake Smith 20:08

Alright! Now, now there's a good opinion for you. So worship style is different. Mary Anne, you mentioned the relationships, and you did mention camp. I know that both of you have been to Spectacular, which is a unique opportunity for young people to meet new folks, to be in a situation where there are lots of young people from the denomination who share values and beliefs. And so, kind of what I hear you saying, but not saying is, is one of perhaps the biggest challenges facing the church, is how to help young people make those meaningful connections within sacred community in the church, because we don't have many of those opportunities, and a lot of our congregations are places where there might be a handful of youth at most, or one or two or that kind of thing. And so how do we make those relationships possible? And one of the ways that I see Say What working is bringing people together over commonalities. So, for me, that's one of the exciting ways I hope that that will be something that comes out of the time together that you guys have with this new podcast. Well, you guys have been doing a great job of answering some questions. I want to turn the tables now for a minute, I'll be the guest, and you guys be the host, because that's going to be your role. And what are some questions that you might have?

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 21:42

I want to start with a really fun question, what was your weirdest experience during recording one of the episodes of the project Zion podcast?

Blake Smith 21:53

Well, there's, I don't know about the weirdest. I would say the most embarrassing for me. So right after I started with Project Zion, which was in January of 2023, and I stepped in to be the project manager, but turned out that I needed to be a host, and I enjoy that. But on this particular occasion, I had set up a meeting with retired apostle Linda Booth, and Apostle Booth records some episodes called Coffee Connect, where she shares stories she has, you know, many, many years in ministry, and has just a ton of stories from across her time in ministry. And she records those, and we use those in our Coffee Connect series. So, one of my first assignments was to set up a time to get on a Zoom meeting with Linda, and get that set up so that she could record. Now it wasn't really an interview, per se, because she was just telling her story. So, all I needed to do was log in, allow her to log in and then let her record, and then kind of wait in case there was an issue, and also be ready to shut things down when she was done. So, she began to tell her stories, and I got distracted, and my phone rang, and I picked up the phone, and I'm having a conversation with someone on the phone, and all of a sudden I hear, "Blake ... Blake ... you're not muted. I'm trying to tell my stories, and I'm hearing your conversation." I was so embarrassed. I was so embarrassed she had to tell that story over. I muted myself, hung up the phone and put it away so that I wouldn't be tempted in case there was a problem, so that that is definitely my most embarrassing moment so far as a host.

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 23:50

Okay, let's go to the opposite end of that spectrum. How about what is your best or favorite experience during recording?

Blake Smith 24:00

That's a really hard question. Recently, I have been doing a number of episodes and interviews for the series called Chai Can't Even. And, Chai Can't Even is a series in Project Zion that is interviews with young adults, or recently aged out of young adults who have been a part of the church for their whole life and have chosen to stay we have a lot of missing generations in the church. The number of people in that say 20 to 40 or 50 range are limited, and so I have had some incredible opportunities to just sit down and listen to the stories of folks who are still involved in the church, who are engaged in ministry in ways that are very exciting, I think, for me and we just talked about relationships, it has given, just being able to be a host and be involved in Project Zion Podcast has given me the opportunity to build some relationships with people I wouldn't otherwise have had the opportunity to do and just learn some great things.

So you said that you started at Project Zion 2023 so what was your vision for what you were going to do with the project Zion podcast when you first started.

Blake Smith 25:27

Well, like I said, when I first started in my goal and vision was to simply make sure that we had everything ready to go when it was supposed to post. We post three podcasts a week, every week for Project Zion Podcast. So that's a lot of you know, it's 160 episodes a year that we post, and we have a team of people, and so it was just my goal to keep things running smoothly. Project Zion Podcast had a really good reputation, and had been running already for a number of years by that time, and I just

didn't want to let any of the plates fall. I had a lot of plates spinning. Very quickly, I think probably behind all of that was this desire to really evaluate what we were doing with Project Zion and find out what areas we were not covering. What were the areas of important issues or topics or things people wanted to know about? And how could we grow so that my goal now is to always be considering what's the growing edge? How can we be relevant? How can we connect the other piece is that project Zion, of course, originally started with its primary focus of providing information to Latter-Day Seekers who were coming to or at least exploring Community of Christ, and that is still a significant piece of what We do, but the content has been so relevant for church members that our listenership has grown to include current members. And so, we're looking at the need for a different type of content, like Say What.

Kassie Ripsam 27:15

So what exactly is your initial intent with Project Zion, and how can we align Say What with that?

Blake Smith 27:24

So again, I think reaching new audiences and providing meaningful, relevant content. So say, what is one of two new things that we're hoping to do? This is, this is the first of those two. I felt that we had a huge hole. We have a series called steamers and sodas. Our description is that, you know, we look back at camps, we have recaps of camps that have happened and ministries that are happening for and with youth, but there never was an opportunity to get a real consistent youth voice, and that was what one of the holes that I thought existed. And so, this is filling what I believe to be a very important need, as I talk with youth and young adults around the church about wanting to engage in some very meaningful conversations. And I think Kassie, like you said earlier, you have a lot of questions. You want to ask those questions. I believe that a lot of people have those same questions. And so, your willingness to come on, and Mary Anne, your willingness to come on and be, in some ways vulnerable, to ask those questions, to get them out on the table, will really be helpful across the board.

Kassie Ripsam 28:47

Have you ever had a guest who gave a very unexpected answer?

Blake Smith 28:56

I have not so far. Although our episodes are not scripted, they are spontaneous, the questions are pretty scripted. And I have not had I so far, and I don't know about the other hosts, but I so far have not had anything where I went, "Oh, I don't know what to do with that answer." So, knock on wood. I hope that that doesn't happen, although, you know what? I really like that our guests have the opportunity to share. I mean, that's why we're doing it. We don't want it to be so scripted that it's just canned answers. I really want to know what people are feeling and experiencing.

Well, let's take a look. You guys might have some additional questions, but I'm looking to see if we have any questions that have come in. If you have any questions that you'd like to ask Marianne and Cassie, this would be the time to do that.

Kassie Ripsam 29:58

I have a few questions for the. Audience.

Blake Smith 30:01

Perfect! Alright. Be ready. Cassie, let them have it.

Kassie Ripsam 30:04

I did mention that my intent was to ask the questions of anyone, really, all people. So what are some of the questions that you would be wanting me to ask? So

Blake Smith 30:19

I've got a I've got one. It says, Clara wants to know when the girls have felt the Holy Spirit unexpectedly. No easy questions here.

Kassie Ripsam 30:31

No, no, apparently, not Clara. So I went once to a youth camp, and was not expecting to go down to the first time that I can think of go down to campfire and to feel the a great rush of Holy Spirit there.

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 30:57

Yeah, I have again, this is youth camp, I think kayaking on the lake in bluff springs, it's, it's the camp we both go to, we all go to. Kayaking is on that lake. It's just so peaceful, um, you go out there, and especially the first day, like the lake is so still, like the only ripples you see are, when you get further out, are the ones of your kayak and water bugs that are skate, that just skate on the water. And you can hear everything, like you can hear, yeah, you definitely can hear the people screaming and jumping and laughing, but you can hear your own heartbeat and the rustle of the leaves, and it's just beautiful. I think that's probably like you don't expect to just go out on a boat and just feel that. I call it a tug on the back of the brainstem. It's beautiful.

For the listeners, who do you want to Who do you want to see as a guest in our in our new podcast series?

Is there a reason specifically that you want, that you want them to be interviewed? That's fine. That's fine. Very good. They're friends of ours.

Kassie Ripsam 32:38

Blake Smith 32:40

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 32:46

Kassie Ripsam 32:48

Blake Smith 33:36

Great. Thanks for that question, Allison. The comment about guests, that's great.

How about closing thoughts? What would you like to leave, do you have anything that you'd like to share with the listeners before we close out?

Mary Anne Bennett-Ripsam 33:50

we're just, honestly, we're just really excited to get started asking the questions and giving some answers. Be really cool. Yeah.

Blake Smith 34:00

So, you're ready to be the interviewer, not the interviewee, huh? Well, first I want to, I want to thank Kassie and Mary Anne, first of all, for saying yes to being hosts for this new series. And I know that it's a little nerve wracking to do that for the first time, and especially to do it live. It's one thing when you can just do it and know that everything can be cut out and nobody's heard it until it's all completely edited, and they were willing to come on tonight as a live event and give you a chance to meet them. So, thank you, Kassie and Mary Anne, for your yes and for being with me tonight and giving our listeners a chance to get to know you.
